#### **GENERAL DESCRIPTION**

The EVAL-ADPD103Z-GEN evaluation board provides the user with a simple means of connecting their own optics to the ADPD103 photometric front end to evaluate the ADPD103 in a number of different applications, from vital signs monitoring to industrial sensing. The evaluation board includes the OpenMarket WaveTool graphical user interface (GUI) that provides the user with low level and high level configurability, real-time frequency and time domain analysis, and User Datagram Protocol (UDP) transfer capability so that the evaluation board can easily interface to the user's development system.

The USB port powers the EVAL-ADPD103Z-GEN. On-board voltage regulators provide voltage supplies for the ADPD103, ADuCM360, and FTDI Chip FT232. There are on-board regulators that provide 3.3 V and 4.3 V LED supplies, as well as a selectable option to add an external LED supply. The evaluation board provides an LED and photodiode (PD) for a finger photoplethysmography (PPG) measurement that is useful for a quick functionality check of the evaluation system.

The schematic and board layout, as well as the board itself, indicate signal names for easy identification. For additional information on the functionality of the ADPD103, refer to the ADPD103 datasheet.




Figure 1. EVAL-ADPD103Z-GEN Evaluation Board

# INSTALLATION INSTALL WAVETOOL

Download the ADPD103 **OpenMarket WaveTool** software package from the EVAL-ADPD103Z-GEN page on analog.com. Unzip the folder and run the **ADPD103\_OpenMarket\_ WaveTool\_Setup.exe** file found in the **WaveTool\_x\_x\_x** folder, following the prompts for software installation.

# CHECKING THE USB SERIAL CONNECTION IN WINDOWS 7




Figure 3. USB-COM Port in Windows® 7

Connect the USB cable to the EVAL-ADPD103Z-GEN evaluation board. Ensure that the COM port driver is installed correctly. To verify proper installation, go to Control Panel > All Control Panel Items > System > Device Manager, as shown in Figure 3. In this case, the proper COM Port selection is USB Serial Port (COM16).

The EVAL-ADPD103Z-GEN evaluation board uses an FT-232R USB UART IC. If the USB driver installation does not install properly, refer to the *FTDI Driver Installation* guide found on the FTDI website.

# **RUNNING THE TOOL**

To start the WaveTool application, navigate to the ADPD103 **OpenMarket WaveTool** from the **Start** menu and click **ADPD103 Tool**.




Figure 5. Automatic Version Update Prompt

At startup, the application automatically checks whether the installed WaveTool version is up to date. If there is a newer version available, the user is prompted to download the new version, as shown in Figure 5.

## **USB UART CONNECTION**




Figure 6. UART Connect

After the application opens, select **File > Connect** (see Figure 6) and from the drop-down menu, select either **Auto Connect** or **Select Port**, depending on whether specific COM port selection is necessary.




Figure 7. Port Selection

If a specific COM port selection is not needed, select **Auto Connect** to automatically connect the WaveTool to the device. Choose **Select Port** to connect the WaveTool to the device via a particular COM port as shown in Figure 7.

# **MAIN SCREEN**

The main screen is divided into two different modes: register level and parameter level/high level.

The register level configuration is used to access each register or to load a complete list of registers that are already stored in a configuration file on the PC.

The parameter level/high level configuration performs a high level configuration of the device without the need for individual register writes. The high level configuration screen is used to setup parameters such as LED current, number of LED pulses, AFE integration time, and so forth.

## **USING THE REGISTER VIEW CONFIGURATION**




Figure 8. Main Screen Register Level View

Figure 8 shows the ADPD configuration window in **Register View**. The following controls and descriptions are listed in the configuration window:

- Firmware Version—shows the firmware version.
- Config File in Use—information about the configuration file that is in use.

- Register View shows the current register values of the device. Change register values by entering a hexadecimal value and then the Enter key on the keyboard.
- Register Field View shows how the register is subdivided into fields that determine how each bit field is used. For example, in Figure 8 it shows that the PAD\_IO\_CTRL Register 0x02 is composed of the bit fields INT\_POL, INT\_DRV, and INT\_ENA to configure the operation of the INT pin.
- The Single Register Control allows reading and writing of individual registers.
- Load a configuration file (.dcfg) by choosing File >
   LoadCfg and selecting a .dcfg file that came with the
   software installation or a custom .dcfg file developed by the
   user for a desired configuration.
- Save a configuration file (.dcfg) by choosing **File > SaveCfg**.
- The Go to High Level button switches to the High Level Control view.

#### **Register View**

To view the registers of the device, select **Register View**, shown in Figure 8. The **Name** column is the register name as defined by the register map, followed by (in parentheses) the address in abbreviated hexadecimal format (see Figure 9). The **Value** column shows the register value of the corresponding register in full hexadecimal format.

Clicking any register in the **Register View** fields reveals the register categories in the **Register Field View**, as shown in Figure 10. The **Register Field View** is read only.

Enter data in cells in the **Value** column of the **Register View** in either hexadecimal or decimal format. A hexadecimal number is entered with a 0x prefix to the number, whereas a decimal number does not include these prefix characters. For example, entering 0xFF (hexadecimal) or 255 (decimal), results in the same value written to the register.

Hovering over a cell in the **Value** column shows the delineation of the register fields for the current value (see Figure 11), whereas hovering over a cell in the **Name** column shows a description of the corresponding register.

The **Register View** has a context sensitive window exposed by right-clicking the mouse anywhere on the grid, as shown in Figure 12.

By using this menu, it is possible to refresh the selected register, refresh all registers, or select whether the selected register displays in hexadecimal or decimal format. The selection of hexadecimal vs. decimal is persistent across opening and closing of the tool.

For example, in Figure 13, the Time Slot B offset registers (CHx\_OFFSET\_B) display in decimal format but others, such as LED drive settings (LEDx\_DRV), display in hexadecimal format.

## Register Field View

The **Register Field View** is a read-only view to see specific register field value(s). It automatically tracks the currently selected register in **Register View**.

The **Register Field View** is composed of two columns as shown in Figure 14.

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The **Register Field View** section shows each register field, where the **Name** column consists of the field name (start bit: length in bits), and the **Value** column provides the hexadecimal value (without the prefix characters, 0x) of that field.

## Single Register Control

The **Single Register Control** section includes controls to read or write an individual register.

The **Read Register** button reads and displays the value of the register entered in the **Register Address** field.

The **Write Register** button writes the register with the value entered in the **Register Value** field.

# PARAMETER LEVEL (HIGH LEVEL)




Figure 16. Main Screen High Level View

Figure 16 shows the ADPD103 high level configuration window. This window offers an entire set of high level parameter controls. The configurable parameters are as follows:

- Sampling Frequency—adjusts the sampling rate.
- Internal Average (identical for both slots)—controls the
  output data rate, which is equal to the sampling frequency
  divided by the internal average. For example, a sampling
  frequency of 400 Hz and an internal average setting of 4, as
  shown in Figure 16, results in an output data rate of 100 Hz.
- ADPD Slot Mode—specifies all the ADPD slot modes.
- Slot A Control and Slot B Control
  - LED Control
    - LED—selects the specific LED from a drop-down menu.
    - **LED Status**—specifies the status of the LED, whether it is in the on or off state.
    - Number Of Pulses—sets the number of LED pulses.
  - TIA Gain—sets the gain of the TIA via a drop-down menu.
  - Timing Control—see the ADPD103 datasheet for detailed descriptions of the timing controls.

- AFE Width—sets the AFE integration time in microseconds.
- Pulse Width—sets the LED pulse width in microseconds.
- Pulse Offset—sets the LED pulse offset in microseconds.
- AFE Offset—sets the coarse AFE integration offset in microseconds.
- **AFE Fine Offset**—sets the fine AFE integration offset in nanoseconds.
- LED 1, LED 2, LED 3 current controls
  - **I\_LED Coarse**—coarse setting for the LED current via a drop-down menu.
  - **Scale Factor**—100% or 40% scale factor applied to the coarse LED current setting.
  - **Final I\_LED**—this is controlled by applying a fine tuning value by using the slider. The **Final I\_LED** current displays in mA.

To switch to the register level configuration, click the **Go to RegisterLevel** button.

#### ADPD SLOT MODE

The ADPD slot mode contains Slot A, Slot B, and their sum and digital integration modes.




Figure 17. ADPD Slot Mode

#### Slot A (16 Bits)

The 4-channel, 16-bit data displays in the **Time View** for Time Slot A only. Selected channel data in the **Channel Select** dropdown box displays in FFT view.

## Slot B (16 Bits)

The 4-channel, 16-bit data displays in the **Time View** for Time Slot B only. Selected channel data in the **Channel Select** dropdown box displays in FFT view.

#### Slot AB (16 Bits)

The 4-channel, 16-bit data displays in the **Time View** for both Time Slot A and Time Slot B. Selected channel data in the **Channel Select** drop-down box displays in FFT view.

#### Slot A (32 Bits)

The 4-channel, 32-bit data displays in the **Time View** for Time Slot A only. Selected channel data in the **Channel Select** dropdown box displays in FFT view.

#### Slot B (32 Bits)

The 4-channel, 32-bit data displays in the **Time View** for Time Slot B only. Selected channel data in the **Channel Select** dropdown box displays in FFT view.

## Slot AB (32 Bits)

The 4-channel, 32-bit data displays in the **Time View** for both Time Slot A and Time Slot B. Selected channel data in the **Channel Select** drop-down box displays in FFT view.

#### Slot A Sum (16 Bits)

The sum of 4-channel, 16-bit data displays in the **Time View** for Time Slot A only. Selected summation sample data in the **Channel Select** drop-down box displays in FFT view.

#### Slot B Sum (16 Bits)

The sum of 4-channel, 16-bit data displays in the **Time View** for Time Slot B only. Selected summation sample data in the **Channel Select** drop-down box displays in FFT view.

#### Slot AB Sum (16 Bits)

The sum of 4-channel, 16-bit data displays in the **Time View** for both Time Slot A and Time Slot B. Selected summation sample data in the **Channel Select** drop-down box displays in FFT view.

#### Slot A Sum (32 Bits)

The sum of 4-channel, 32-bit data displays in the time view for Time Slot A only. Selected summation sample data in the **Channel Select** drop-down box displays in FFT view.

#### Slot B Sum (32 Bits)

The sum of 4-channel, 32-bit data displays in the **Time View** for Time Slot B only. Selected summation sample data in the **Channel Select** drop-down box displays in FFT view.

#### Slot AB Sum (32 Bits)

The sum of 4-channel, 32-bit data displays in the **Time View** for both Time Slot A and Time Slot B. Selected summation sample data in the **Channel Select** drop-down box displays in FFT view.

## Slot A Dig Int-1 (16-Bits)

16-bit digital integrated sample data displays in the **Time View** for Time Slot A only. Selected sample data in the **Channel Select** drop-down box displays in FFT view.

## Slot B Dig Int-1 (16 Bits)

16-bit digital integrated sample data displays in the **Time View** for Time Slot B only. Selected sample data in the **Channel Select** drop-down box displays in FFT view.

## Slot AB Dig Int-1 (16 Bits)

16-bit digital integrated sample data displays in the **Time View** for Time Slot A and Time Slot B. Selected sample data in the **Channel Select** drop-down box displays in FFT view.

#### Slot A Dig Int-2 (16 Bits)

16-bit digital integrated sample and background data displays in the **Time View** for Time Slot A only. Selected sample or background data in the **Channel Select** drop-down box displays in FFT view.

#### Slot B Dig Int-2 (16-Bits)

16-bit digital integrated sample and background data displays in the **Time View** for Time Slot B only. Selected sample or background data in the **Channel Select** drop-down box displays in FFT view.

#### Slot AB Dig Int-2 (16 Bits)

16-bit digital integrated sample and background data displays in the **Time View** for Time Slot A and Time Slot B. Selected sample or background data in the **Channel Select** drop-down box displays in FFT view.

## Slot A Dig Int-1 (32 Bits)

32-bit digital integrated sample data displays in the **Time View** for Time Slot A only. Selected sample data in the **Channel Select** drop-down box displays in the FFT view.

## Slot B Dig Int-1 32 Bits:

32-bit digital integrated sample data displays in the **Time View** for Time Slot B only. Selected sample data in the **Channel Select** drop-down box displays in the FFT view.

### Slot AB Dig Int-1 (32 Bits)

32-bit digital integrated sample data displays in the **Time View** for Time Slot A and Time Slot B. Selected sample data in the **Channel Select** drop-down box displays in the FFT view.

#### Slot A Dig Int-2 (32 Bits)

32-bit digital integrated sample and background data display in the **Time View** for Time Slot A only. Selected sample or background data in the **Channel Select** drop-down box display in the FFT view.

### Slot B Dig Int-2 (32 Bits)

32-bit digital integrated sample and background data display in the **Time View** for Time Slot B only. Selected sample or background data in the **Channel Select** drop-down box display in the FFT view.

#### Slot AB Dig Int-2 (32 Bits)

32-bit digital integrated sample and background data display in the **Time View** for Time Slot A and Time Slot B. Selected sample or background data in the **Channel Select** drop-down box display in the FFT view.

## LOAD AND SAVING CONFIGURATIONS




Figure 18. Load Configuration




Figure 19. Save Configuration

To load and save device configuration files use File > Load Cfg and File > Save Cfg, respectively, as shown in Figure 18 and Figure 19. Load configuration (Load Cfg) loads the set of registers mentioned in the user selected .dcfg file to ADPD103. Save configuration (Save Cfg) saves all writable registers of ADPD103 to a .dcfg file via the Open file dialog box.

Find sample configuration files installed with the WaveTool application in the **SampleCfgs** folder.

Selecting **Load Cfg** opens up a file dialog window. Device configuration files have the extension .dcfg. Once loaded, the configuration file used by the evaluation board is indicated in the main window, as shown in Figure 20. The full path of the .dcfg file is shown when the mouse hovers over the file name. If no file is loaded, then it is indicated as **None**.

A configuration file uses the following format:

Address Data #(comment optional)

Where the address can be an in 8-bit or 16-bit format and the data must be in 16-bit format, as follows:

- 14 0555 #setup input PD configuration
- 15 0220 #number of averages = 4
- 18 1F80 #slot A channel 1 ADC offset
- 19 1F80 #slot A channel 2 ADC offset

#### **APPLY CONFIGURATION**

A previously loaded configuration remains in the memory of the tool until overwritten by a new load configuration (LoadCfg). Therefore, to return to a loaded configuration quickly, it is not necessary to reload the configuration, instead select File > Apply Config.




Figure 21. Apply Configuration

#### **DUMP REGISTERS**




Figure 22. Dump Register

With the tool, it is possible to dump all the registers to a single file by selecting **File > Register Dump**, as shown in Figure 22.

Registers are dumped into a text file with a filename given by the user upon opening the **File** dialog box, a window that prompts the user to save the file to a specific location with a specific name.

The following is an example of a register dump:

PD\_SELECT (14) 0555

INT\_AVG\_MODE (15) 0220

CH1\_OFFSET\_A (18) 1F80

CH2\_OFFSET\_A (19) 1F80

Note that, the register is listed by name (address in hexadecimal value).

# **GRAPH VIEW**




Figure 23. View Menu




Figure 24. Time View

Use **Graph View** or real-time frequency and time domain analysis of the ADPD103 raw data. Access **Graph View** from the main window via the **View** menu tab, as shown in Figure 23. When the **Graph View** opens, it defaults to the time domain view (**Time View**) as shown in Figure 24. There is also a **Frequency View** tab for frequency domain analysis.

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#### Time View

**Time View** displays the raw data from the sensor in time domain format. Plot or send the raw data through the UDP protocol to the host system that is controlled by a checkbox in the **Time View**, which has three controls:

 UDP on/plot off, where the UDP Transfer checkbox is checked (see Figure 25).

• UDP off/plot on, where the **UDP Transfer** checkbox is not selected (see Figure 26).

In UDP on mode, the data is sent through UDP and does not display in the graph panel.

In UDP off/plot on mode, the data displays in the graph panel but is not sent through the UDP.

In UDP on/plot on mode, the data is sent through UDP and also displays in the graph panel.

The **UDP Transfer Tool**, a separate executable within the WaveTool package, receives the data from WaveTool and transfers the data to the assigned UDP port.

To save the raw data into a file, check the **Save Raw Data** checkbox, as shown in Figure 28. When the box is checked, the user is prompted to save the file.

Configure the x-axis sample count for graph plotting through the **X-Axis Sample Counts** field (see Figure 29).

Note that, the minimum value for sample count is limited to 100. If it is assigned with values smaller than 100, it automatically corrects to 100.

Time View shows the raw data graph that plots Sample (index) vs. LSBs data.

The plot of each individual channel is controlled using the checkboxes as shown in Figure 30.

By clicking the checkbox the corresponding channel data is plotted with the specified color in the Raw Data graph.

The auto scaling of the time graph view can be enabled/disabled by a checkbox present at the bottom of the time graph. Also the minimum and maximum scale range can be adjusted while the auto scale option is disabled.




Figure 31. Auto Scale Control and Scale Range Setting

The average and standard deviation for every channel and sum of all channels are displayed along the bottom of the time graph view. These statistics are enabled or disabled by the checkbox preceded by each label as shown in Figure 32.

#### **General Controls**




Figure 35. Pause and Resume Icon

Using standard controls, the user can start (see Figure 33), stop the current mode and return to idle mode (see Figure 34), and pause the device in its current operating state (see Figure 35) whereby graphs are no longer updated but data is still retrieved from the device.

#### **FREQUENCY VIEW**

**Frequency View** shows the fast fourier transform (FFT) of the raw data in the form of a graph that plots amplitude vs. frequency (Hz). The user can select the x-axis scale type as linear or logarithmic in the **XAxis Scale Type** drop-down list, as shown in Figure 36.

The **FFT Samples** field provides the number of samples used to calculate the FFT.

Note: The minimum value for sample count is limited to 50 samples. If it is assigned with values smaller than 50, it automatically corrects to 50.




Figure 38. Slot A Channels

The **Frequency View** displays any one of the enabled channels from the **Channel Select** drop-down list. For example, if Slot A is enabled, the user can select any one channel of Slot A, as shown in Figure 38.




Figure 40. Logarithmic FFT Graph

# **TOOLS**

## **OPTIONS**

The **Options** selection from the **Tools** drop-down menu shows the general board settings as well as the UDP configuration.

#### General

The **General** tab contains information about the device, the platform, and the firmware version.




Figure 41. Options Window: General

## **UDP Configuration**

The **UDP Configuration** tab allows the user to configure the port numbers for UDP communication. The UDP transfer tool sends the raw data to the client via the specified port numbers. The IP address field should be filled with the IP address in which the UDP transfer tool is running.

Use the **Raw Data Transfer Port** field to assign the port number for sending raw data from WaveTool to the data transfer tool.




Figure 42. Options Window: UDP Configuration

## **AUTOMATIC UPDATE**

The **Tools** > **Auto Update** function enables/disables the automatic software update functionality at the time of tool start. When **Auto Update** is enabled, it checks for the availability of a new **WaveTool** update and prompts the user to update the tool with the latest version.




Figure 43. Auto Update

## **CHECK FOR UPDATES**

Use the **Tools** > **Check For Updates** function to manually check for the availability of a new software update.




Figure 44. Check for Update

## **FIRMWARE UPDATE**

Note: The WaveTool must be connected with the target board to perform the firmware update; otherwise, the WaveTool shows a disconnect message (see Figure 45).

Use the **Tools** > **Firmware Update** function to start the firmware update process.




Figure 46. Firmware update

When **Firmware Update** is selected, the CM3WSD firmware flashing tool opens.




Figure 47. Firmware Flashing Tool

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To flash the firmware, the user must ensure that the correct path and filename are selected in the file dialog box, as shown in Figure 47.

With the correct path/filename entered and the correct USB serial port selected, click **Start**. The user is then prompted to pulse the **Reset** button while holding down the **Download** button on the evaluation board (circled in Figure 48). The firmware download starts when this step is completed.

When the firmware download has completed, click **Reset** in the **CM3WSD** window and then **Exit**. The user can now return to the WaveTool and reconnect the device via **File** > **Connect** to commence testing with the updated firmware.

#### **SEND REPORT**




Figure 49. Report Alert

If the software update failed for ten times continuously, it opens the pop-up window shown in Figure 49.




Figure 50. Email Window

When the user clicks **Yes**, another window appears (see Figure 50).

Enter your name in the **Enter Your Name** field and your user email ID (this is the email address you used when registering to receive the software package) in the **Enter Your Email ID** field. After entering your user name and email ID, click **Send** to initiate the report to Analog Devices.

## **EXITING APPLICATION**

There is a two-step process to exit the application.




Figure 51. Disconnect

1. Disconnect the device via **File** > **Disconnect Ctrl+D**, as shown in Figure 51.




Figure 52. Exit

2. Exit via **File** > **Exit**, as shown in Figure 52.

# **UDP TRANSFER TOOL**

This section explains the raw data reception and its data format for various modes from the UDP transfer tool over UDP protocol.

#### **UDP TRANSFER TOOL SETUP**

To setup the UDP transfer tool, follow these steps:

Open WaveTool and go to Tools > Options > UDP
 Configuration. Enter the IP address of the remote machine where the UDP transfer tool is running.




Figure 53. UDP Configuration

 Connect the hardware (File > Connect > Auto Connect or File > Connect > Select Port) using the UART bridge on the host machine.




Figure 54. Connection

3. Open **Graph View** and check the **UDP Transfer** box in the **Time View** tab.




Figure 55. Enable UDP Transfer

4. Click the play button to send the raw data through the UDP protocol.

To save the raw data being transferred via UDP to a data file, open the receiver tool (**UDPTransferTool.exe**) and enter the IP address of the system.




Figure 56. UDP Receiver Tool

1. Enter the file name to save the raw data from WaveTool and press enter.




Figure 57. Decision to Continue or Stop

2. The received packet count is continuously displayed in the tool and the raw data is stored in the file.




Figure 58. Receiving Raw Data

3. Press the **ESC** key to stop receiving the data and close the current file.





Figure 59. Closing the File

#### **RAW DATA FORMAT**

Before using the UDP transfer tool, ensure that WaveTool is opened and running with UDP transfer enabled. See Figure 60 for an example of stored sample raw data.

The sample data transmits in the form of ASCII bytes. The sample data format is as follows:

F0136CFC0000000FE90000105000000EA000000FCC

- The first two characters (F0) represent sync.
- Next two characters (13) represent size.
- Next two characters (6C) represent sequence number.
- Next four characters (FC00) represent time stamp.
- The remaining characters represent the hexadecimal channel raw data and its count (based on the slot modes of the WaveTool).

# **UDP CONTROLLER TOOL**

Open the **UDP** controller tool (see Figure 61) and complete the **Enter your Host IP Address** field. This is the IP address of the system where the WaveTool is running.

After entering the corresponding IP address, the user can send and receive commands between the controller and the WaveTool.

#### **PROCEDURE**

#### **Port Connection**

To use the read register or write register functions, the port must be connected in the OpenMarket WaveTool. Connect the port using the following steps:

- 1. Open the ADPD103 OpenMarket WaveTool application.
- 2. Connect the port. From **File > Connect** select either
  - a. Auto Connect (to automatically select the port) or
  - b. **Select Port** (to manually select the port).
- 3. Ensure the UDP control IP address is assigned correctly.

## **Read Register**

After connecting to the port, send the register read command as **00 01 <reg address>**, for example, send as 00 01 01 to read from register 0x01.

00 = register read command

01 = number of parameters

01 = register address

The response is received with the register value.




Figure 62. Read Register Operation

## Write Register

After connecting the port following the instructions in the Port Connection section, send the register write command as **00 03** <**reg address**> <**Value**>, for example, send as 00 03 01 00 01, where

00 = register write command

03 = number of parameters

01 = register address

00 01 = register value

The response is received with the register value.




Figure 63. Write Register Operation

#### Run

Open the ADPD103 **OpenMarket WaveTool** application and connect the port (see the Port Connection section). If bridge is connected, then open the graph view: **View** > **Graph**.

Next, send the play command as 02 00, where

02 = play command

00 = number of parameters

## Stop

Open the ADPD103 **OpenMarket WaveTool** application and connect the port (see the Port Connection section). If bridge is connected, then open the graph view: **View** > **Graph**.

Next, send the stop command as 03 00, where

03 = stop command

00 = number of parameters

## **Load Configuration**

Open the ADPD103 **OpenMarket WaveTool** application and connect the port (see the Port Connection section). If bridge is

connected, then a command can be sent to WaveTool through the UDP.

Next, send the load configuration file command as **0D 00**, which gives a list of available configuration file names as shown in Figure 64.

Select the particular configuration file using the following command, based upon which configuration from the list is to be loaded. For example, **0D 01 (01/02/03....../07).** 

Likewise, commands can be given for connect, disconnect, open view, and raw data by referring to the command list in Table 3.
